



DANCE REVIEW

Ballet Fantastique stuns with imaginative 'Zorro'

Ballet Fantastique's "Zorro," staged Friday at the Hult Center for the Performing Arts, was imaginative, fun and fantastic.

Using the "Zorro" origin story by Isabel Allende, Ballet Fantastique followed the legendary hero from his humble California beginnings in 1790 to Spain where he dons his cape and mask to fight for the downtrodden as El Zorro.

Gustavo Ramirez dazzled as charismatic Diego de la Vera/Zorro, taking charge of the stage using his outstanding technique to execute the bold innovative choreography of Donna Marisa Bontrager and Hannah Bontrager.

The California-based band Incendio provided a musical backdrop with an exhilarating mix of guitars and percussion by Jean Pierre Durand, Jim Stubblefield, Liza Carbe and Timothy Curle. Internationally acclaimed guest violinist Brandan Vance lent romantic aura with his smooth violin. Acclaimed Oregon composer Kim Angelis composed half the ballet's music, while Incendio composed the rest. The alchemy produced by mixing the excellent dancers, stunning music, bright costumes and fearless choreography makes this a ballet to be seen again and again.

Jane Morgan danced Toypurnia, Daughter of the Wolf (Diego's mother) with strength and grace. Translating some Native American dance moves with classic ballet worked amazingly well throughout the ballet. Della Griffin danced the Shaman, White Owl (Diego's grandmother). The Warrior women — Ashley Bontrager, Hannah Bontrager, Tracy Fuller and Carolin Koepplin - exhibited their strong

The delightful Hacienda girls were danced by Kenzie Ballenger, Phoebe Green, Della Griffin, Delancey Schultz, Faith Slater and Peace Van Den Elzen.

Jim Ballard was sedate, charming and comical as Bernardo, Diego's best friend, and as Don Tomas de Romeau, aristocrat (host to Diego). His mobile face and his graceful moves makes him an important character dancer with the

Hannah Urso Eades, as the fox who appears to Diego during his spirit quest, wove breathtaking body tricks while descending from the stage ceiling by long fabric strips and swinging over the dancers. Magical.

This was the last act for stunning dancer Leanne Mizzoni, who has been with the company since 2009. Her focus, strength, technique and beautiful body will be missed. Mizzoni danced Light in the Night, love of Bernardo, with her unique spirited style.

Ashley Bontrager and Hannah Bontrager also danced as Diego's muses and the sisters Juliana de Romeau and Isabel de Romeau, sliding into their different roles as easily as donning a familiar coat.

Guest artist Rafael Moncada danced the villain, the rake who would pay Romeau (Ballard with a frightful wig!) with superb technique. His red costume and perfect beard and mustache singled him out on stage, wherever he was. Of course, Zorro does not let him win.

Kenzie Ballenger, Lu Lei Napier, Faith Slater, and Peace Van Den Elzen were captivating Spanish ladies. Their beautiful costumes and smooth dancing complemented the tale.

As the costumes were front and center throughout the ballet, I must give kudos to the costume designers. Donna Marisa Bontrager had the vision. The design team included Allison Ditson/ Allihalla, Kalan Guetti/Primadonna Tutus, LA and Rita Perini Vance. The marvelous head pieces came from Mitra Chester.

Antibiotic needs can differ

ear Dr. Roach: I have had two angioplasty procedures completed, one in 1999 and the second in 2014. Stents were inserted during each procedure. As a preventive measure, my dentist wants me to take four antibiotic pills (amoxicillin) before I see the hygienist. What is the reason for this? Do you feel it is necessary to take antibiotics before each visit to the hygien-

Dear E.L.S.: Antibiotic prophylaxis is not routinely recommended for people with cardiac stents. The risk of infection is very low, probably lower than the small risk of an adverse event from the antibiotics. It's not clear that taking antibiotics would even reduce this already small

People with some cardiac problems, such as a prosthetic heart valve, some types of congenital heart disease or a prior history of infection of the heart valve should take antibi-

But, in general, antibiotics for a low-risk person is not recommended. Of course, I would get assurance

from your cardiologist that there is not something distinct about your case, but from what you have told me, I wouldn't recommend antibiot-
